

The Church gives us guidelines about what to include in the programme. She tells us:

• Confirmation preparation should help us come to know Jesus more deeply --

The Catechism tells us that the preparation for Confirmation should aim at leading the Christian towards a more intimate union with Christ.¹

• There is a link between baptism and confirmation

The Introduction to the *Rite of Confirmation* tells us that Confirmation strengthens and confirms what happened in baptism — completing the grace of baptism. This is why the renewal of baptismal promises takes place preceding the reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation.²

• Witnessing or Apostolic Work

Confirmation further initiates our journey of faith. The candidates are admitted to the community with a goal, so they are empowered for that and they are sent to proclaim the good news. The Catechism tells us that the time of preparation for confirmation should help the young people to be more capable of assuming the apostolic responsibilities of Christian life.³

• Confirmande must be suitably disposed and instructed

Canon law tells us that the confirmandi must be properly disposed and suitably instructed to celebrate the sacrament.⁴ The candidate should be regularly attending Mass on Sundays with a level of understanding of the Mass commensurate with his/her ability. The Catechism tells us that candidates should celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation by way of their preparation.⁵

Catechesis for confirmation should take place in the parish and it should truly reflect the mind of the Church

We are told that, as with baptism, catechesis for Confirmation should take place within the parish community — since it is the faith community into whose life of prayer and worship the candidates will be more fully initiated.⁶ The children have a right to be taught by catechists who truly reflect the mind of the Church and, in this regard, their parents and catechists have a right to formation in contemporary theology.⁷

• Families should be part of the process of initiation. Pope Benedict XVI reminds us that the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and First Communion) are key moments not only for the individual receiving them but also for the entire family, which should be supported in its educational role by the various elements of the ecclesial community; he says that parish pastoral programmes should make the most of this highly significant moment.⁸ This why parishes should offer and parents should participate in parish pre-sacramental catechesis.

There must be `content' in the catechesis

The General Directory for Catechesis tells us that we find content in Scripture, through witness (or apostolic work), in our Creed (our profession of faith, through our lived moral values and in our liturgies and in our prayer.⁹ In fact, the Catechism of the Catholic Church is structured around these same fundamental dimensions (or pillars) of the Christian life.¹⁰

Welcome the Spirit: a Catechist's Confirmation Handbook, Sr. Mary Bernard Potter, S.P. and Nigel Bavidge, Leeds Diocese, Geoffrey Chapman, London, 1996 (8 sessions, 2 celebrations)



This is a hands-on resource for Confirmation courses in every Catholic parish. It contains everything the catechist needs for every session, including photocopiable invitations, games and prayers. It involves parents, parish and schools and should be an invaluable tool for the new catechist in need of practical help and confidence. The Confirmation course was developed by the diocese of Leeds RE Centre and piloted in the diocese. It contains material for the Confirmation of young people aged 10-14, in an introductory session and eight meetings. Each unit begins with a statement of the aims of the unit, an outline, a list of suggested material, hints on preparation and worksheets. The programme strongly advises a retreat weekend. This programme is widely used in the UK. It is an excellent resource material for catechists; but it lacks

a session on moral choices for young people, it doesn't encourage the catechists to ensure that the sacrament of reconciliation is celebrated and it doesn't invite the candidates to become involved in a *service project* or some kind of *community work* or *involvement* in the parish community

The cost of this programme is £16.99; it appears expensive because each catechist should have a copy but the candidates do not need copies; there are handouts for them which can be copied.

Preparing to be Confirmed: a series of sessions to prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation, Diana Klein, McCrimmons Publishers, London, 2002 www.**mccrimmons**.com (9 sessions, 2 celebrations)



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This is another hands-on resource programme, which aims to prepare young people to celebrate the sacrament of Confirmation. The catechumenal process reflected in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) serves as both the inspiration and the theological and pastoral foundation of the programme. Each unit begins with a statement of the aims of its aims and prayer and each session is based on Scripture, It places a strong emphasis on how Confirmation confirms and strengthens what happened in baptism and, that, in Confirmation, we renew our baptismal promises – confirming our commitment to be followers of Christ. It recommends two days of recollection or a retreat weekend. It includes everything the catechist needs for every session, including photocopiable sheets for the Masses of Enrolment and Commitment. There is a CD with the programme so that catechists can personalise the sessions and make hand-outs for the candidates. The programme was developed by one of the catechetical advisers in Westminster Diocese and piloted in the diocese. This programme is widely used in the UK. The material is aimed at young people aged 14-16 years old. It is an excellent resource material for catechists; but it is sacramental preparation and not religious education – and it assumes a level of religious knowledge in the candidates. If that is not present, additional material will be required.

The cost of this programme is £14.99; each catechist should have a copy and in some parishes each candidate is given (or buys) a copy; there are handouts for them which can be copied.

Confirmed in a Faithful Community, published in 2006 by St. Mary's Press, Winona, Minnesota USA, <u>www.smp.org</u>. (9 sessions query celebrations)



The "Confirmed in a Faithful Community" series provides direction and resources for preparing young people aged 14-17 years old for the Sacrament of Confirmation. It is adaptable for either a one- or two-year process of preparation, and is designed for use with any level of young people years 9-11. The catechumenal process reflected in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) serves as both the inspiration and the theological and pastoral foundation of "Confirmed in a Faithful Community". The principles of the RCIA are reflected throughout the process of preparation. The catechetical dimension of the process (that is, the educational sessions as distinct from the programme's liturgies, retreats and other elements) consists of 22 90-minute sessions. Parishes can choose from the sessions to create a process suited to their particular needs. The tone and methodology of the catechetical sessions are highly evangelising. The sessions do not presume a prior faith commitment on the part of the candidates, but the programme presents the central and defining characteristics of Catholicism. The co-ordinator's manual contains information on: the history, theology and pastoral practice of confirmation; directions for parish planning; retreat models; and guidance for liturgical rites.

The programme comprises of four separate resources: the candidate's handbook (\pounds 25.91), the co-ordinator's manual (\pounds 15.49), the catechist's guide (\pounds 19.98), and the sponsor's guide (\pounds 1.62).

Survival Guide to Confirmation: The Catechist's Guide, Stephen Gomez, St. Paul's Publications, Slough, 1995 (18 sessions, 2 celebrations)



This programmes is recommended by the Bishop of Clifton, + Mervyn Alexander, as being rooted in the daily experience of the candidate and starting from where they are. Every effort is made to face the real dilemmas of young people and to help them discover Christ at a deeper level. They are challenged to commit themselves to the spiritual adventure of belonging to Christ as disciples and friends. The programme begins with two major assumptions: the first is that the candidate is not interested in religion and does not want to attend Confirmation classes and is personally not bothered about receiving the sacrament and the second is that the catechist is relatively inexperienced at running Confirmation classes. The idea of the catechists being dragged by the priest on the cover of the catechist's guide and the young people being dragged by the catechist on the candidate's guide give the impression that the catechists are not willing to catechise these teenagers and the candidates do not really want to be confirmed; but this programme has been used a resource by many people over the years. This programme suggests an *away day* or a retreat.

The programme comprises of two books: a catechist's guide (£5.95) and a candidate's book (£3.50).

We Celebrate Confirmation: Rev. William J. Koptlik and Joan E. Brady, Silver Burdette Company, New Jersey, 1997 (7 sessions; 4 celebrations)



The **We Celebrate Confirmation** programme was very popular in the 1980's. It was the first (or one of the first) to reflect the catechumenal model of catechesis. It is very easy to follow and is very focused. It includes lesson plans that are easy to plan and share with the candidates. The programme includes a celebration manual which includes planned prayer celebrations relating to the themes of the programme. The director's manual provides many ideas and suggestions to implement the programme – all very helpful in assuring its success. The candidate's book provides a complete preparation as well as opportunities for personal reflection and expression. There is no recommendation for a retreat; it suggests that the on-going session is presented at a day of recollection. This programme places a strong emphasis on the candidates' involvement in *community work* or in a *service project*.

The programme comprises of four books: a candidate's book (£9.99), a catechist's guide (£24.25), a celebration guide (£13.25) and a director's manual (£41.50).

Born in the Spirit of Jesus: Richard Reichert, Brown-Roa, Dubuque, Iowa, 2002 (8 sessions; 1 celebration)



The current **Born in the Spirit of Jesus** programme is revised from one published in 1985 (although it is very similar to the original version). The teacher's manual offers clear guidance for each session – a teaching goal and a student objective. The programme refers to the catechist as a religion teacher. The catechumenal process reflected in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) serves as both the inspiration and the framework of the programme. Each session offers a few written activities for the student and each session asks the student to do a scripture search. After the first five sessions (which are analogous to the pre-catechumenate period), the students are asked to make a final decision to be confirmed. The programme is designed for early adolescents aged 12-15. The parents and sponsors are expected to be actively involved in the programme. Guidance is offered for the parents' involvement; a sponsor's manual is provided for the sponsors, who are expected to spend an hour a week with the student during the programme. The programme expects the students to attend a retreat day towards the end of the programme – as immediate preparation for the confirmation celebration.

The programme comprises of three books: a candidate's book (£5.99), a teacher's manual (£48.39) and an apprentice programme manual for confirmation sponsors (included with the teacher's manual).

Celebrating Our Faith: Margaret Hanrahan, Brown-Roa, Dubuque, Iowa, 1999 (8 Sessions)



"Celebrating our Faith" provides clear direction for using this programme. The catechumenal process reflected in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) has inspired this resource. The tone and methodology of the catechetical sessions is based on strategies that address at least two intelligences. The catechist's guide explains this in an attempt to help the catechist to discern what intelligences work best with their group. Family involvement is essential; indeed, in the first session a family member must join the candidate. There is an emphasis on community service. The programme includes a weekend retreat and offers detailed notes for it. The co-ordinator's manual contains information on: the history of Confirmation. The manual offers letters, forms, prayers and examples of covenants. Each session includes information on Catholic believes and offers ideas for videos and other resources. Each session includes a handout for the parents.

The programme comprises of two books: the Confirmation Catechist Manual (£24.99), candidate's book (£3.00)

Power Through His Spirit: a preparation programme for the Sacrament of Confirmation, Matthew James, London, 2000 (7 sessions)



Power Through His Spirit is an invaluable resource for catechists who are working with young people preparing to celebrate Confirmation. It is aimed at younger children – aged 11. It has been developed in a parish situation and offers a sound framework for planning Confirmation Programmes, while allowing flexibility to accommodate individual parish requirements. *Power Through His Spirit*:

- gives an insight into the catechetical process which will be of value for new catechists
- provides an overview of the elements necessary in a Confirmation Programme
- includes Catechist's Outlines for planning 7 Faith-Sharing Sessions with Handout Sheets for photocopying
- contains guidelines for planning Liturgies with particular emphasis on Reconciliation Services for young people
- offers suggestions for prayer and resources which have relevance to young people's lives Kathy Hunnybun has ten years experience as a parish catechist working with young people preparing to celebrate Confirmation and also as a Parish Confirmation Team Co-ordinator

Getting Confirmed, Steve Givens, Redemptorist Publications, Hampshire



Introduces the sacrament in a friendly, challenging and realistic style. Ideal for candidates from age 12. This book looks at the nature of confirmation and includes a questions-and -answers section and a guide to realistic Christian decision making. It is not a Confirmation programme; but candidates are sometimes given a copy of the booklet to help them understand the sacrament.

Your Child's Confirmation, Carol Luebering, Redemptorist Publications, Hampshire



Your Child's Confirmation will help you sort things through while you and your child prepare for the sacrament. Each chapter offers questions for reflection or discussion and passages from the liturgy of the sacrament, Scripture and the Catechism of the Catholic Church for prayerful meditation. This sacramental preparation resource concludes with a look at the Confirmation rite itself.

"Plugged In – Youth CaFE" is a six week DVD based course, including icebreakers, small group discussions and interactive prayer times.



Fr Stan Fortuna, a Franciscan Friar of the Renewal from New York, explains the elements of the Eucharist in an engaging and inspirational way. With testimonies from young people, this resource will help many to unpack the riches of the Mass with a fast-moving multi-media presentation designed for young adults. Through teaching and testimony it explains why Jesus came and how we can experience the effect of Him in our lives, especially through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. With input from Fr Stan John Pridmore, an ex-gangster and now an international youth evangelist, young people from around the country, music, images and opportunities for prayer and discussion. The DVDs come with training material for leaders, a comprehensive leader's manual, a CD featuring contemporary Christian artists, and sample publicity material.

Each session addresses questions that are of particular relevance to young people, such as why they should go to Mass when they find it boring, or why they should say no to sex. This excellent resource – described as a virtual gold mine for youth movements – can be used to supplement a Confirmation programme; it might be used alongside a Confirmation programme; it does not meet the criteria for a Confirmation programme.

Impact! is a programme from the YCW for 13-17 year olds. It brings young people together in groups to enable them to link life and faith and to make



a difference in the world. Through the reflection and action (see, judge, act) teenagers grow in confidence and responsibility, becoming leaders in their own lives – serving, educating and representing other young people. The material includes magazine style leader guides (for the young people), a DVD containing clips for a weekly meeting and a comprehensive adult accompaniers' guide. To complement the glossy teenagers' enquiry magazines, the DVD presents

discussion starters to encourage them to think about the issues which they face and scripture reflections to engage them in linking faith and the issues. This is not a Confirmation programme but it is a resource to support work in parishes with young people before, during and after their Confirmation preparation.
