No one looks forward to a stay in hospital, but if it becomes necessary, it is important that you are well cared for. Part of that good care is the Hospital Chaplaincy Service; a multi-faith department whose role is to provide for the spiritual, pastoral and religious needs of patients and their relatives.

It is well recognised that not everyone is a church-goer or necessarily wants religious services, but that the very act of being taken into hospital can disturb our sense of self and normality.

Chaplains offer a friendly face, a listening ear, a chance to talk through thoughts and concerns, prayer, religious advice, and comfort and the support of the Sacraments. Everything is held in confidence.

Chaplains visit the wards during the week and provide an 'on-call' service in case of emergency.

On admission to hospital please ensure that your religion is registered and confirm that this information may be passed to the RC Chaplain.

- + If you would like a chaplain to visit please ask ward staff to contact the appropriate chaplain.
- + If your relative is admitted to hospital please notify the chaplain.
- + If you let us know you're there, we can be there for you.

The Sacrament of the Sick

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick offers Christ's healing and strength to the elderly, anyone who has a life-threatening illness or is facing an operation.

If you know that you are being admitted to hospital it is in order for you to contact your parish priest to make arrangements to receive the Sacrament before your admission. He may offer to anoint you during a weekday Mass, at home with your family, or privately at a convenient place and time. Whatever you choose it is a rich opportunity to allow your parish community to support you in your sickness and suffering.

If you are admitted to hospital in an emergency, it is still possible to call on your priest to visit and administer the Sacrament, or you can ask ward staff to contact the Roman Catholic chaplain at the hospital who will be pleased to visit and arrange for the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick and any other

prayerful and sacramental support that may assist you through your hospital stay.



How to contact the RC Chaplain

Contact details for all Diocese of Westminster Healthcare Chaplains, and hospitals within the diocese are posted in the directory on the diocesan www.rcdow.org.uk.

They are also listed in the Westminster Year Book under Chaplaincies: Hospitals and Hospice. Details of your local hospital chaplain will often be noted in the parish newsletter or posted at the back of church.

If you are having difficulty contacting the hospital chaplain, your parish priest will be able to help you.
