

Update on Allen Hall and the Seminary

We have much to celebrate this year. Four of our students were ordained as deacons and three have been ordained to the priesthood. At the same time, the number of men exploring their vocations continues to rise. In the coming year, Allen Hall will have oversight of the formation of over fifty seminarians. Of these, over thirty will be resident in Allen Hall. There was a time, just a few years ago, when there were just nine men living in Allen Hall. So we look forward with confidence!

We were very fortunate as a seminary to take over a former convent here in the heart of central London in 1975 and establish Allen Hall. The seminary is named after Cardinal Allen, our founder in the penal times of the 16th century. Our location enables our seminarians to live within striking distance of pastoral opportunities in parishes, hospitals, schools, and prisons. It is also close to Heythrop College, where they study for their theology degrees, and a short distance to the Cathedral.

Built in the 19th century, Allen Hall has its challenges as the fabric gets older. At its heart, it has a striking chapel erected after the Second World War when the original chapel was destroyed in the bombing of London. I say 'at its heart' for a very good reason. Our prayer life is at the centre of everything we do. It is the lifeblood of our community, indeed of any well-lived life, and it underpins a seminarian's discernment.

After 40 years the chapel has required some urgent work. Part of the concrete roof is falling down. The heating has all but given up. We found asbestos and, like any parish church, it needs a thorough general updating. This we have begun to undertake over the last year, so that it is safe at last and warm, bringing it modestly back to life.

There is always more to do in an old building such as this one. This summer we will begin work on the library roof which has fallen in and is now dangerous. We have also begun planning for the replacement of our classroom facilities. Currently these are housed in two old portakabins. Built 30 years ago with a life expectancy of eight years, they are now rotting away.

We have no funds of our own. So we are very grateful that much of this very necessary programme of work – and the support of the seminarians – is being funded generously by you, through *Growing in Faith*. Thank you for this. We are always struck by the great support we receive in every way.

I am confident that Allen Hall can train the priests we need in the years to come. Please continue to pray for vocations.

Update on Our Sick and Retired Priests

The Sick and Retired Priests Fund and Committee is responsible for the care of all clergy in our Diocese who are either retired or ill. Priests normally step down from full-time active ministry when they turn 75. Some however, continue to serve in a supply capacity.

The number of priests retiring over the coming years is set to rise significantly. As a Diocese we are currently caring for 79 clergy, with a further ten on sick leave. Ten more are expected to retire over the next twelve months alone. Additionally, 44% of our priests – nearly 200 - in active ministry today will step down over the next 20 years.

Three priests have retired in the last six months. One of them requires assisted living. Another priest lives in a care home. And the third has returned to Ireland.

Last year, the annual collection raised nearly £185,000, with the previous year's collection bringing £180,000. We also received general donations of nearly £300,000, with one third coming from the generosity of a single parish.

Over the coming years, we recognise that there will be a shortfall in funds. The current level of donations, which have stayed relatively the same for the past several years, will not support the ever increasing number of sick and retired priests.

We thank you for your support in **Growing in Faith** which will allow us to plan and support our mission to look after our clergy, who have dedicated their lives to serve our parishes, when they retire. With your continued support, we are now in a strong position to take care of them.

Update on Caritas Westminster

A team of Caritas project workers is attracting 'social action' volunteers, providing training, and supporting parishes and deaneries to work together. We invite expertise where needed, from Catholic agencies such as Housing Justice, the Cardinal Hume Centre and the Catholic Children's Society, to improve and sustain social outreach. We are working closely with colleagues in the St Vincent de Paul Society and Justice and Peace to bring together our respective strengths to achieve much more by working together.

We have identified seven key areas of work. They are:

- Supporting people who find themselves in food poverty and debt By the end of the year we will have doubled the number of schools we are supporting to provide free healthy breakfasts.
- Supporting lonely, isolated and vulnerable people Caritas is currently working with Contact the Elderly to support Sunday afternoon tea parties for over 75's. Three parishes are involved and we are looking to sign up more.
- 3. Supporting the Catholic deaf community Our team of skilled interpreters ensure that the Catholic deaf community has accessible liturgies, faith sharing, Bible study, counselling and leisure activities.
- 4. Supporting people with intellectual disabilities and their families Caritas at St Joseph's in Hendon provides life-long learning opportunities for over 200 adults with intellectual disabilities. In late 2014 we will launch a satellite centre in the parish centre of Hounslow.
- 5. Supporting young people at risk of social exclusion Caritas is currently in conversation with partner agencies about how we could add value to this area of work in the future.
- 6. Supporting victims of human trafficking With the support of a number of organisations including the Bishops Conference of England and Wales, the Metropolitan Police and religious orders, Caritas is launching Project Bakhita to support victims of human trafficking.
- 7. Supporting people who are homeless We are working with Housing Justice to optimise coverage with the winter night shelter provision in our parishes.

Thank you for your support through **Growing in Faith**. The journey to spread God's love has only begun as we endeavour to build the Kingdom of God in London.


