

Enhancing Parish Life



By design, parishes will be the largest beneficiaries of *Growing in Faith*. More than £12 million has already been raised for local projects. *Growing in Faith* is giving parishes the opportunity to achieve things that are beyond regularly available resources. Some parishes are working towards large, ambitious projects and others have identified up to six smaller projects. Every single initiative will help transform parish life, benefitting current and future generations.

More than 250 projects have been identified, many of which are in the planning stages or are underway. New Caritas Projects on the Way



Thanks to your support and together with parishes and other organisations, *Caritas Westminster* is already making a genuine difference to people who are in need in our society. And this work is growing every week.

- The first pilot Caritas 'hub' will support parishes in the St Alban's and Watford deaneries. The aim is to have a number of hubs spread across the Diocese. Each will have its own Caritas Development Worker who will help lay leaders and parish priests to identify the biggest needs in their local communities, train volunteers and find appropriate solutions. - The number of schools involved in the Magic Breakfast initiative will double.
- Contact the Elderly will be expanded to four new parishes: Chelsea, Hillingdon,
 Kensington and Ruislip. Parish volunteers will host monthly tea parties for lonely and isolated individuals, helping to
 replace loneliness with companionship.
- By early 2015, a satellite centre of St Joseph's Pastoral Centre will be opened in Hounslow. Local people will have access to activities and lifelong learning services. Catechists will receive training and materials to share with those with intellectual disabilities.

Six New Seminarians for Our Parishes

As vocations continue to increase in the UK, we are blessed to have 32 seminarians. Ranging in age, with the youngest aged 22, they come from a variety of backgrounds including a doctor, a teacher, and a policeman. In September, we welcomed six new men to our seminary. Each one is on a journey of formation, the purpose of which is to form the whole person. This takes four to seven years.

Growing in Faith is allowing us to support our seminarians, men who are answering God's call to serve where they are needed. Thanks to the generosity of parishioners across our Diocese, the Priest Training Fund is being replenished and we are confident we will be able to fully guide and form all these men until, God willing, they are ordained, and begin serving our parish communities.



On Wednesday 3rd September, our seminarians gathered in Welwyn Garden City for a first opportunity to reflect on the upcoming academic year. Eleven are studying in Rome, one is taking part in a propaedeutic year to discern his vocation at the Royal English College in Vallodolid, Spain, and 20 live at Allen Hall in London. At the latter, they will undertake their academic studies both at Allen Hall and Heythrop College, and pastoral placements in nearby hospitals, prisons, schools and parishes. Please keep all our seminarians in your prayers.

Where Do Our Retired Priests Live?

Independent living

Many of our priests remain very active in retirement. There are different places where they live independently supported by the Diocese:

- A flat within a presbytery
- Houses or flats across the Diocese
- Sheltered accommodation such as St Joseph's Society, Brook Green
- Some return home to Ireland

Continuing to live in the Diocese means they can still say Mass in a supply capacity, be close to the communities they have served and attend clergy and deanery meetings.

Care

Some of our priests need additional help. There are various care homes across the Diocese where they can live, such as the Larmenier Centre in East Finchley, which is run by the Sisters of Nazareth.

Nursing care

We know people are living longer and full-time care is necessary for some of our priests as they get older. Pastoral care must always be provided. Our aim is to find our clergy homes where they can easily attend Mass.

These include:

- Larmenier Centre, East Finchley
- Nazareth House, Hammersmith
- Orione House, Hampton Wick
- St Anne's, Stoke Newington
- St Peter's, Vauxhall
- St Vincent's, Pinner
- St Wilfred's, Chelsea






Today, a quarter of our priests are retired. In addition, we are caring for 12 active clergy who are unwell.

In the coming years, we will need to provide increased care, not only to these men, but to those who are approaching retirement. More than half of our priests in active ministry are over the age of 60. We have an obligation to provide adequately for their

Rebuilding Lives with Project Bakhita




Human trafficking is the second most profitable crime in the world. At any given time 2.5 million people are trafficked. Over half of those trafficked to the UK come through London. Forced to work against their will, victims live a life of fear, abuse and isolation. They are in need of our love and friendship.

Our Diocese is taking the lead to put an end to this 'open wound on the body of contemporary society.' Working together with the Bishops Conference and the Metropolitan Police, Project Bakhita will support victims of human trafficking who are rescued and help them to rebuild their lives. Pastoral care, education, reintegration and prevention will be the key areas of focus. We will give a voice to the voiceless. We look forward to sharing more on this in the months ahead.

Since 1975, Allen Hall has been 'home' to many of our priests during their years of formation. The staff and students who live there are immersed in a rich heritage, surrounded by history and have easy access to important learning and pastoral experiences.

The building itself, a former convent, is over 100 year old and plays a crucial role in educating our future priests. The chapel, at the heart of a deepening relationship with Christ, was recently renewed. The library and aging portakabin classrooms are now in urgent need of attention.
